We acknowledge that we are gathered today on the traditional lands of the Anishinaabek (AUh-nish-in-ah-bek), Haudenosaunee (Ho-den-no-show-nee), Lunaapéewak (Len-ah-pay-wuk) and Attawandaron (Add-a-won-da-run).

We acknowledge all the treaties that are specific to this area: the Two Row Wampum Belt Treaty of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy/Silver Covenant Chain; the Beaver Hunting Grounds of the Haudenosaunee NANFAN Treaty of 1701; the McKee Treaty of 1790, the London Township Treaty of 1796, the Huron Tract Treaty of 1827, with the Anishinaabeg, and the Dish with One Spoon Covenant Wampum of the Anishnaabek and Haudenosaunee.

This land continues to be home to diverse Indigenous peoples (First Nations, Métis and Inuit) whom we recognize as contemporary stewards of the land and vital contributors to

society. We hold all that is in the natural world in our highest esteem and give honor to the wonderment of all things within Creation. We bring our minds together as one to share good words, thoughts, feelings and sincerely send them out to each other and to all parts of creation. We are grateful for the natural gifts in our world, and we encourage everyone to be faithful to the natural laws of Creation.

The three Indigenous Nations that are neighbours to London are the Chippewas of the Thames First Nation; Oneida Nation of the Thames; and the Munsee-Delaware Nation who all continue to live as sovereign Nations with individual and unique languages, cultures and customs.

This Land Acknowledgement is a small step towards reconciliation. It is the work of all citizens to step towards decolonizing practices and bringing our awareness into action. We encourage everyone to be informed about the traditional lands, Treaties, history, and cultures of the Indigenous people local to their region and throughout Turtle Island.



FOLK MUSIC ONTARIO BOARD MEMBERS



Award-winning artist Cécile Doo-Kingué is considered one of Canada's finest guitarists and singer-songwriters. First generation from Cameroon, the NYC-born Montrealer has released four albums to critical acclaim, received 8 Maple Blues Awards nominations and has extensively toured domestically and internationally, including most major folk, blues and jazz festivals in Canada, earning a reputation for blistering live sets, strong social commentary and guitar prowess. She has opened for, shared a stage and/or recorded with Montreal Jubilation Choir, Canned Heat, Angelique Kidjo, Ruthie Foster to name but a few.

In 2008, Cecile and Gern Vlchek co-created Chick Pickin' Mondays, offering a safespace and equitable gig for women and genderqueer artists. Cécile has since expanded the concept to curate and present private showcases at music conferences including FMO and Folk Alliance International.



Umair Jaffar is the Executive Director of Small World Music, one of Toronto's pioneering and most significant presenters of culturally-diverse music. Since arriving in Toronto in 2014, he has worked in curatorial and management roles at cultural institutions including the Aga Khan Museum and Harbourfront Centre. Prior to immigrating, he was the CEO & Artistic Director for IPAC (Institute for Preservation of Art and Culture), a Pakistan-based non-profit social enterprise that focused on developing sustainable solutions for preserving and promoting indigenous, folk and traditional performing arts. Umair also serves as a board member for several non-profit art organizations including CAPACOA, North York Arts and MusiConnect Asia. He has an MBA from University of Adelaide, Australia and a MSc Cultural Anthropology from University of Oxford, UK.



Since her first FMO Conference with the Developing Artists Program in 2018, Cassidy has known that the FMO community was a place she could call home. An emerging singer-songwriter from Northern Ontario with a University background in Health Promotion, Cassidy is empowered to be a voice for youth and help shape the future for a thriving folk music community.

He was a board member for Home Routes/Chemins Chez Nous from 2018-21 and juries for industry organizations in several jurisdictions. Chris holds a master's degree in ethnomusicology from the University of Toronto and is now a PhD student in history at Queen's University, where he is studying the archival collections of Canadian women folklore collectors. He also runs a small artist & events services company called Seachange Music.

She is a singer/songwriter with 2 EPs and 1 full length album under her belt that have garnered acclaim across Turtle Island, including an Indigenous Music Award nomination for Best Pop Album in 2017. Her newest album, Enough, was released in June of 2021. Tara also holds degrees in social work, law, and Indigenous governance, is a Senior Researcher at the Indigenous Law Research Unit at the University of Victoria and a Research Fellow with the Yellowhead Institute.

Jo Proulx DIRECTOR TERM ENDS 2024

Radio producer Jo Proulx(French/ Abenaki) created the weekly Frenchspeaking radio show ICI INDIEon 105.1 FM that exclusively plays music by Indigenous artists. The idea of this show came after realizing that Indigenous musicians are often automatically boxed into the traditional Indigenous flute-and-drum genre. Indigenous musicians have always been part of the mainstream music industry, including Folk music, but are often not acknowledged. ICI INDIEspins all genres (Folk, Americana, Country, Dance, Punk, Rock, Hip Hop) to break that stereotype. In April 2022, Jo founded Aki Media, a radio promotion and tracking company that promotes Indigenous artists beyond genres. Current artist roaster includes several Folk artists: Digging Roots, Amanda Rheaume, Julian Taylor, and Morgan Toney.



Candace Shaw DIRECTOR TERM ENDS 2024

Candace Shaw is a Feminist, Cultural Producer, and Activist who has been a fixture on the Canadian music scene for almost thirty years. She was the long-time Artistic Director for the Peterborough Folk Festival, Chair of the Shelter Valley Folk Festival, and Booker for the Music City Summer Series in The Distillery District, Toronto, amongst other roles. She is a thoughtful, engaging, and provocative commentator and advocate for women, the arts, and arts workers' rights, and in 2019 was a candidate in the Federal election. Candace is the founder of Secret Frequency.ca, a not-for-profit advocacy and education organization working with under-represented people in the Canadian music industry.



Sherry Sinclaire DIRECTOR TERM ENDS 2024

Sherry Sinclaire has been working in the Canadian music and entertainment industry for over 25 years, with more than a decade focusing on digital content. For the past five years she has been operating and running her own company, Sinclaire Creative Solutions, which offers business strategy, label management and marketing solutions, as well as, digital content delivery and rights management. Sherry manages award winning singer songwriter,

Canadian folk music gem, Catherine MacLellan. Previously working at companies like Bell Media, TELUS, Virgin Records, MCA/Universal Concerts (now Live Nation) and TicketMaster has allowed her to develop relationships throughout the recording, concert, radio, press, television, film, and telecom industries. Sherry's skills in partner management, marketing, promotions, event management, digital content and business strategy; gives her the rare advantage of understanding how the industry works with content partners, product development, legal, and government regulatory bodies. Sherryis passionate about helping independent and developing artists who often benefit from her previous work with global acts such as Taylor Swift, The Rolling Stones, David Bowie, Janet Jackson and top television brands like HBO Canada, CTV, TSN, Space and Much.

FOLK MUSIC ONTARIO ANNOUNCES ERIN BENJAMIN AND TREASA LEVASSEUR AS THE 2023 ESTELLE KLEIN AWARD RECIPIENTS

The Estelle Klein Lifetime Achievement Award will be presented to Erin Benjamin and the inaugural Estelle Klein Community Builder Award will be presented to Treasa Levasseur. Erin and Treasa will receive their awards and be honoured with a special video & presentation at the Ontario Folk Music Awards on Sunday, October 15, 2023.

Named after Estelle Klein, a long-time advocate of Canadian Folk music and one of the initial founders of the Folk festival scene, the Estelle Klein Award honours the work of an individual or group that has made significant contributions to Ontario's folk music community. For the first time in 2023, the Estelle Klein Award has been divided into two separate areas of recognition - The Community Builder Award, and The Lifetime Achievement Award. Recipients are nominated by the members of Folk Music Ontario, and selected by a committee made up of the board of directors and invited stakeholders.



ERIN BENJAMIN - LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

An award-winning community builder and driving force in Canadian Association leadership, Erin Benjamin has worked in the music industry for over 25 years. Originally a touring and recording artist and then as executive director of both Folk Music Ontario (2001) and the Canadian Arts Presenting Association (2008), today Erin continues her work as the first and only President & CEO of the Canadian Live Music Association (since its founding in 2014). An unflagging champion for the live music sector, particularly during COVID-19, she currently serves as a board member for the Ottawa Board of Trade, the United Way Eastern Ontario and the Ottawa Film Office. Over the years she has served a wide variety of organizations as a board member including The Unison Fund, Folk Alliance International, the Songwriters Association of Canada, the National Arts Centre's Creation Fund, RBC Ottawa Bluesfest and others.

"Erin is a tenacious and inspiring leader, whose story is woven into the fabric of folk community through her career as an artist, nearly a decade of building Folk Music Ontario into the organization it is today, advising a wide breadth of music industry organizations through her board service, and ultimately, being a champion for the live music industry; our festivals, venues and live music workers. 

Buccioni served on the board of Toronto Operetta Theatre for 4 years including 1.5 years as President. While active as a musician Buccioni was known for his work as a Hammond Organist and Keyboardist with the Julian Taylor Band, the Out of Towners and Chameleon Project.





PETER NORTH

Peter North has enjoyed a multi-faceted career that has been centred around promoting roots music of all forms.

He spent 25 years writing music columns for Edmonton's daily newspapers. In television he booked Ian Tyson's nationally syndicated Sun Country series for six years in the eighties and another seven years co-producing the CBC music series Country Beat. SARAH CARD

Sarah Card is the founder and producer of the Bear Creek Folk Festival, in Grande Prairie AB. The event runs mid August and features over 30 world class artists. Headliners have included kd lang, Sarah McLachlan, Blue Rodeo, Steve Earle, Feist, and more. Founded in 2016, Sarah has led the charge, including coordinating over 500 volunteers annually, to create the largest tourism draw in the history of the Grande Prairie region. The sellout crowd in 2023 will see 7500+ people on site per day.



STEPHEN ANTLE

Stephen Antle has had a career in broadcasting starting in long-form documentary radio at CBC Cape Breton back in the late 1980's. From there he pursued university in Halifax while working as an actor and musician through the early 1990's and returned to broadcasting in 1997 when he was hired to launch a new TV station in Edmonton, AB. "Stanfest", as it has come to be known, is an international songwriter's festival that presents a roster of over 40 accomplished artists/acts from a wide range of genres. The event, hosted in Canso, Nova Scotia is a 4 day, multi-stage festival. Troy is also the Creative Director of the deCoste Performing Arts Centre in Pictou, Nova Scotia, a 400 seat facility that presents 100+ events each year. The deCoste's presents a rich mix of shows, predominantly music, but also including dance, theatre, comedy, film and variety.



KERRY CLARKE

Community radio was Kerry's entry into the independent music world 36 years ago. She's artistic and marketing director of the 44 year 'post-folk' Calgary Folk Music Festival, the winter Block Heater festival and an off-season concert series. She spent some time on the skins in an all-female lo-fi band decades ago, is on several non-profit arts boards, has served on many arts juries, is a proud part of WRAD (western roots artistic directors) and NApresenters, co-founded Rwanda's KigaliUp festival, and produces/hosts weekly CKUA and CJSW radio programs when she's not traveling to conferences and festivals to see music from a vast range of genres.





MARIA THEESSINK

Maria Theessink is the artistic director at Tønder Festival in Denmark. The festival can celebrate it so 50th edition in 2024. We present traditional music, americana, country, blues, cajun, zydeco, singer songwriters. Almost everything can go as long as it's GOOD. The festival is nonprofit. We have app. 3000 volunteers. The festival is last weekend of August.



VAL DENN

Valerie is very active in the World Music/Roots/Americana/ community as an agent and a manager. She is passionate about her artists and especially adept at helping her clients with export development and building global careers. Val served for four years on the Board of Directors for Folk Alliance International where she also served a term as President. Val teaches and partners with other industry events to lead workshops/panels for the enrichment of the creative/artistic process. She has been a mentor at SXSW, Mundial Montreal, WOMEX, Folk Music Canada, ECMA's and participated on numerous panels at industry events. She currently is on the board as interim President of Folk Music Canada and a board member of the Live Music Society- which gives grants to small venues in the US. Val is the Canadian Ambassador for The House of Songs based in Austin, Texas. This organization matches songwriters globally for co-writing experiences and has residencies in Austin, Bentonville, AR, New York City, and opening new "houses" in Nordic countries.

In her spare time, she is an organic farmer and potter with her husband of 41 years in Nova Scotia Canada.

Lisa Schwartz is a well-known consultant specializing in program design, curation and marketing for festivals and conferences in the US and UK. ABIGAIL LAPELL

Toronto songwriter Abigail Lapell returns with Stolen Time, her elemental and powerfully evocative third album. Produced by Howard Bilerman (Leonard Cohen, U.S. Girls) at Montreal's Hotel2Tango, Stolen Time feels unhurried, psychedelic and otherworldly in the vein of Gillian Welch or Karen Dalton. An eclectic cast of musicians including Fats Kaplin (John Prine, Beck), Christine Bougie (Bahamas, Gretchen Peters), Dani Nash (Andy Shauf, Sarah Harmer), and Dan Fortin (John Southworth, Serena Ryder) - underscores the power of Lapell's vocals on live-off-the-floor,

70s folk rock arrangements featuring bass, drums, horns, strings and steel. But many of the album's standout tracks are solo guitar or piano songs, backed by little more than ghostly accordion or harmonica. The result is Lapell's most ambitious and confident album to date, which has earned praise from Rolling Stone, Brooklyn Vegan, Flood, Exclaim! and No Depression. Over the past five years and two spellbinding releases, Lapell has garnered three Canadian Folk Music Awards (English Songwriter of the Year in 2020 and 2022, and Contemporary Album of the Year in 2017) and a staggering 30 million+ Spotify streams while touring widely across Canada, the U.S. and Europe. Stolen Time was released April 2022 on Outside Music.



al Qahwa

Al Qahwa is Maryem Tollar on vocals, riqq (Arabic tambourine) and qanun (Arabic table harp); Ernie Tollar on wind instruments; Demetri Petsalakis on oud; Naghmeh Fahrahmand on percussion; and Waleed Abdulhamid on bass and vocals. The group name Al Qahwa is Arabic for "the coffee house". It was inspired by the coffee house culture in the Middle East where people would go to hear the latest news, music, poetry and stories. The repertoire began with traditional songs from Syria, Egypt and Iraq. In 2018, the group started adding original repertoire by members of the band. Al Qahwa's new recording "Weyn Allah" was released on June 1, 2023 on all digital platforms. The CD was made possible by The Toronto Arts Council and The Ontario Arts Council.



AMANDA RHEAUME

Winner of the 2023 Capital Music Awards for Album of the Year (The Spaces in Between) and Winner of the 2023 Canadian Folk Music Awards for Indigenous Songwriter of the Year, Amanda Rheaume's (she/her) rootsy, guitar-driven ballads introduce crucial dimensions to the world of Heartland Rock. In a genre characterized by anthems of underdogs, assumptions, and unfair advantages, Rheaume's sound and story crucially and radically expand geographic and cultural boundaries to make space for new perspectives on resistance and resilience. A Citizen of the Métis Nation and an active and proud member of the 2SLGBTQ+ community, Rheaume's music is indeed from the heart, and the land.

First a songwriter, Rheaume comes from a long line of tireless, transformational organizers and activists. She carries this lineage forward in her ever-growing role as a crucial builder of Indigenous music infrastructure and community. From the International Indigenous Music Summit, to co-founded Ishkodé Records, and the National Indigenous Music Office, the goal of raising Indigenous sovereignty in the music industry drives all of Rheaume?s work.

Rheaume has released 5 full-length albums over a period of 15 years, at the same time fostering a self-managed career travelling for countless tours and milestones. 2013's Keep a Fire was nominated for a JUNO Award and won a Canadian Folk Music Award for Indigenous Songwriter of the Year. With her most recent album, "The Spaces In Between," (2022) featuring songs that embody a driving, surging Copperhead Road-esque journey through a wilfully, harmfully misrepresented chapter in a violent colonial timeline, Rheaume makes a powerful statement about history and identity.



ANGELIQUE FRANCIS

JUNO Award winning artist Angelique Francis is a versatile and exceptionally gifted musician. This multi-talented, multi-instrumentalist, multi-genre singer-songwriter/ composer has wowed audiences across the globe with her electrifying performances, instrumental abilities and powerful textured vocals. She is known for her eclectic mix of various musical genres including Folk, Blues, Soul, Roots, Gospel and Americana. Angelique has shared the stage/opened for a large roster of well-known musicians such as Gary Clark Jr, Joe Bonamassa, Eric Gales, Keb'Mo', Jimmy Vivino, Beth Hart, Tom Cochran, Burton Cummings, and many more. Her diversity, passion and love of music can be heard in all of her original compositions.

She has recently been awarded with a 2023 JUNO Award for her Album 'Long River', two 2023 Canadian Blues Music Awards (Maple Blues Awards), and her band, The Angelique Francis Band has won the 2023 Capital Music Award for Group of The Year. She was also nominated for a 2023 Canadian Folk Music Award, and a 2022 Ontario Folk Music Award.

This highly sought-after musician hosted the 2022 Canadian Blues Music Awards, and was a feature act at the Keeping the Blues Alive at Sea festival (Miami to Jamaica), Grolsch Blues Festival (Germany), Sighisoara Blues Festival (Romania), Massey Hall, Montreal Jazz Festival, Mariposa Folk Fest, Calgary Folk fest, Canmore Folk Fest, Ottawa Blues Festival, Ottawa Jazz Festival, London Music Festival, Mont-Tremblant Blues Festival, Trios-Rivieres Blues festival, and the list goes on.



AYSANABEE

Aysanabee (he/him) is a multi-instrumentalist, producer and singer songwriter currently based in Toronto. He is Oji-Cree, Sucker Clan of the Sandy Lake First Nation, a remote fly-in community in the far reaches of Northwestern Ontario.

Aysanabee (Evan Pang) began creating music under his mother's maiden name during the pandemic when the stillness allowed him to slow down and create music that, he says, more accurately represents himself as an artist. With a swirling mix of indie, soul, and electronic sounds, mournful saxophone, and pulse-quickening fingerpicking, Aysanabee's music is both hypnotic and melodious, and has been compared to Bon Iver, Matt Corby, Don Ross, Kim Churchill, Kings of Leon, and Sam Smith among others.

His debut album, Watin (Nov 2022), named after his grandfather, includes 10 tracks and nine interludes featuring the voice of his grandfather that combines music and journalism with artistry and expression. "Watin' actually started out as a series of conversations between myself and my grandfather", says Aysanabee. "We spent the first year of the pandemic talking about things we've never spoken about, his life on the trapline on Sandy Lake First Nation, falling in love, his life in residential school and then leaving everything behind. We never spoke of it until now. Even though we were over 1,000 kilometres apart, it was probably the closest we've ever been."

In what became a whirlwind year for Aysanabee, he released his first single, We Were Here in July of 2022. This single charted on the Indigenous Music Countdown and was featured on an episode of Station 19. This single was also performed live at the 2023 JUNO Awards, further solidifying Aysanabee as a major player in Canadian music. The year continued with the release of Nomads (August 2022) which charted on Billboard Canada, became #1 on CBC Music and #1 on the Alternative Radio Chart (March 2023), and finally, Ego Death (October 2022), which led up to the release of his full album, Watin, in November.

With the success of his debut releases, 2023 continues that wave of accomplishments with multiple nominations, awards, and a full summer tour schedule, further proof that Aysanabee has made a name for himself as a unique and talented artist, one that will continue to influence Canadian music for years to come.



Barbra Lica

Barbra Lica is a JUNO-nominated singer-songwriter based in Toronto. A seasoned act on the Canadian and American club and festival circuits, Barbra Lica has performed everywhere from New York City's legendary Birdland to Toronto's prestigious Koerner Hall. She has also headlined at festivals around the world including Festival International de Jazz de Montréal, Tokyo International Jazz Festival, Focsani Blues Festival (Romania) and Xerox Rochester International Jazz Festival, opening for the likes of Christian McBride, Pat Metheny and Terence Blanchard. Her 2017 album, You're Fine (Justin Time Records), marked the introduction of Folk and Americana to her repertoire and has amassed over 5.6 million streams to date on Spotify. In addition to writing for herself, Barbra has written cuts for such artists as jazz crooner Matt Dusk (Entertainment One/Universal), rising J-Pop singer Harumi (Sony Music Japan), and Taiwanese pop recording artist, Morrison Ma (Universal Music Group/X Entertainment). She is currently promoting her first self-produced EP 'Imposter Syndrome' - released October 2022 with generous support from FACTOR, as well as her new chamber orchestra project featuring all-original songs arranged by Barbra for 14 instruments plus voice.



DIGGING ROOTS

Digging Roots breathe life into songs from their land, Turtle Island, they raise their voices in solidarity with a global chorus of Indigenous artists, activists and change-makers.

For over a decade, two-time JUNO Award winners Digging Roots have traveled the world with a joyful message of resistance, celebrating Anishinaabe and Onkwehón: we traditions of round dance and interconnectedness. As Roots Music Canada says, the band is "... badass, empowering and hopeful all at the same time."

The beating hearts of Digging Roots, founding duo ShoShona Kish and Raven Kanatakta, have built a home for a talented community of players and collaborators including their son, drummer Skye Polson.

For long time fans or new audiences, their constantly evolving live show opens a space, wherever they may be in the world, for healing, compassion, unconditional love and Baamaadziwin (the good life). Constantly interweaving between drum culture and guitar dialects, Raven and ShoShona were raised in cultural families that have continued to resist oppression and colonialism.

More than a band, Digging Roots have taken their place at the frontline of the fight for equity and representation in the arts, with involvement in industry advocacy and organization to empower arts communities worldwide. ShoShona is the founder of the International Indigenous Music Summit and the music label Ishk'dé Records.



EMILY SCHULTZ

Recognized by David Foster as a world-class, up-and-coming talent, Emily Schultz has injected herself into the Canadian music scene with force and grace. Combining powerful vocals, honest songwriting and guitar, she has developed a passionate experience that speaks honestly of human existence, and releases it with a performance energy that is both raw and intimate. Pulling inspiration from Patty Griffin to Ben Howard, Noah Kahan to India Arie, Emily has concocted her own brand of music that will both open your soul and get you singing your heart out. Featured on eTalk, Much Music and Breakfast TV, and a seasoned festival performer (Hops & Harvest Festival, Blue Skies Festival, Edmonton Folk Music Festival) with over 200 performances under her belt in the last year, Emily's songwriting credits have 2 million+ streams across DSPs. Her long-awaited debut EP 'Family Name' dropped earlier this year, garnering global attention and cementing herself as a timeless artist to watch.



Julian Taylor

With a soulful voice and captivating stage presence, Julian Taylor is a unique and important voice on the Canadian roots-and-folk scene. His unique blend of blues, roots, country, and folk music has earned him a growing fanbase and critical acclaim.



LENKA LICHTENBERG

Lenka Lichtenberg was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia. She spent her childhood years as a 'child star' in the musical theatre Semafor. She studied classical music at the Prague Music Conservatory, specializing in voice. Escaping the Communist regime, Lenka arrived in Vancouver, B.C. as a landed immigrant. She received her B.Ed. from the University of British Columbia and a Master's Degree in Ethnomusicology from York University. She taught music at the Toronto Metropolitan University (1997-2005) while raising three children.

In 2002, Lenka co-founded the Yiddish swing all-female group Sisters of Sheynville, with whom she performed across Canada, the U.S. and Europe. In 2010, she founded her group Fray; their two albums of original music fuse her own Eastern European roots with the band members? diverse cultural sensibilities.

Lenka tours internationally as a soloist, and with the various ensembles; she has released seven solo albums and several collaborations. Two of Lenka?s albums, MASARYK (2017) and Yiddish Journey (2018), were released on the U.K. label ARC Music. She has received multiple awards and nominations, including two Canadian Folk Music Awards, Juno Award, an Independent Music Award and Global Music Award.

Since 2020, Lenka lives on a farm near Bewdley in Eastern Ontario with her husband and two lovable rescue dogs. When not growing vegetables, she continues her work as a vocalist, cantorial soloist and choir leader. She performs with an all-woman ensemble created for the performance of her project Thieves of Dreams, and with the project Silent Tears.



MADISON VIOLET

Madison Violet is a critically acclaimed, multi-instrumentalist duo that has been captivating audiences with their exquisite harmonies and heartfelt songwriting for over 2 decades. The duo is comprised of singer-songwriters, Brenley MacEachern and Lisa MacIsaac. Both are proud members of the 2SLGBTQ+ community.

The pair have racked up numerous awards and nominations over the span of their career, including a Canadian Folk award for 'Vocal Group of the Year', Critic's Choice Award from Country Music People's Magazine, JUNO nomination for 'Roots & Traditional Album of the Year,' and multiple ECMA nominations. Their songs have been featured in various film and television shows, MOJO Magazine's Top 10 Playlist, and received mass acclaim from outlets such as the BBC, the CBC, Maverick Magazine and NPR. Madison Violet were the first Canadians ever to win the Maxell John Lennon Songwriting Grand Prize and were on Germany's WDR's list of 'Best Bands of All Time'.

Madison Violet released their first ever, self-produced album 'eleven' in 2022.

Beyond their success in the studio and on stage, Madison Violet has earned praise for their songwriting abilities. Their lyrics are introspective, often exploring themes of love, loss, and resilience. With a unique blend of talent, authenticity, and a genuine love for their craft, Madison Violet continues to share their stories, leaving an indelible mark on the folk-pop landscape. Their remarkable achievements and unwavering commitment to their artistry have solidified their position as one of the most revered acts in contemporary folk music.



MAMA'S BROKE

Mama's Broke is a powerful folk duo that delivers a compelling performance with heart and raw energy. Although highly influenced by their Canadian roots, Lisa and Amy are based out of nowhere and everywhere.

Their two strong voices blend to create haunting harmonies, while they artfully juggle fiddle, banjo, guitar and mandolin, and incorporate traditional dance and foot percussion into their performance. Their original, and often dark, compositions push the boundaries of tradition and the constraints of genre. Drawing from old-time, Quebecois, blues, punk, Celtic, Balkan and doom metal, they create a soundscape that is both familiar and new.

Since forming the band in 2014, Mama's Broke has been gaining momentum fast; having already completed two European, and several Canadian and U.S. tours. They have performed in a wide range of venues, from circus shows in New Orleans, to pirate ships in Amsterdam, to concert halls in Ireland, to theatres in Brooklyn. In this way, they stay true to the transient nature of folklore, as they travel the world sharing and collecting song.

2017 brought the release of their debut album, Count the Wicked, which earned them a Canadian Folk Music Award for Ensemble of the Year as well as a nomination for an ECMA Rising Star Award. In 2022 they released their JUNO nominated sophomore album Narrow line, on Free Dirt Records.

The driving force behind this band is, and has always been, the commitment to challenge borders between people, places and traditions; while encouraging freedom of expression and community through music.



mia Kelly

Mia Kelly is a singer-songwriter from Gatineau, Quebec who writes and performs in both French and English. Mia enthralls listeners with a distinctive blend of Folk, Rock, and Blues and is making her mark in the Canadian folk music scene. Backed by her performance on guitar or piano and accompanied by foot percussion, Kelly's foot-stomping sing-a-longs are anchored by her powerful voice that emanates raw emotion. Her infectious energy captivates you as she shares her heartfelt stories & banter.

Swiftly gaining recognition as a poetic lyricist with a powerful and versatile voice, Mia is a born performer who radiates confidence on stage. With her knack for adapting the stories of the people she has connected with in her life, Mia is an imaginative storyteller who channels her raw and vulnerable emotions through her expertly crafted songs.

In August of 2022, Kelly released her first album 'Garden Through the War'. Produced and mixed at Fixed Hinge Studio by Ottawa's Jim Bryson (Kathleen Edwards, The Tragically Hip) and mastered by Grammy-nominated Phillip Shaw Bova, the record demonstrates maturity in Kelly's songwriting. Exploring themes of resilience and growth that follow hardship, the album has already received recognition from the SOCAN Foundation. This year, Kelly was awarded Emerging Artist of the Year by Culture Outaouais, was nominated as Solo Artist of the Year at the Capital Music Awards, and has been selected to represent Canada in the 2023 Jeux De La Francophonie.



MICHAEL DARCY & THE ATLANTIC TRAMPS

After releasing his solo debut 'Simple Drop of Rain' in 2018, Canadian-based, Irish folk singer-songwriter Michael Darcy returned to the studio with his new band 'The Atlantic Tramps' in tow for the eagerly-awaited follow-up album, 'Down to the Roots'. Drawing from the well of rich Irish music that he grew up with and also being inspired by gritty American songwriters like John Prine & Guy Clark, he aimed to create a whirlwind of folk traditions where greengrass meets bluegrass. Released in July 2022 to critical acclaim, Down to the Roots was described by UK magazine 'Folk and Honey' as 'an excellent album; well-crafted songs with detailed arrangements brought to life with virtuosic flair." 'Irish Music Magazine' raved that "Darcy's originals sit so comfortably within the genre that you'd swear they've been around for generations." The album also garnered a 2023 Canadian Folk Music Award nomination for 'Traditional Singer of the Year'.



Shakura s'aida

Shakura S'Aida is an award-winning performer, who has travelled the globe for more than two decades, connecting and inspiring audiences with her powerful vocals. An undeniable talent and an advocate for human rights, her artistic work reflects that which impacts and connects us all: Community, life, and lov. "I believe we all have a responsibility to look after each other," says the Toronto-based artist. "I see, create, and use music as a way to bring people together."

A central figure in Toronto's music scene, the Brooklyn-born, Swiss-raised entertainer has garnered not only an international recording and touring career but has shined on the theatre stage as star and creator of the four-woman tribute to Nina Simone, The Nina Project, and in roles on-screen including as Lena, member of the beloved 'Jazzagals' in the acclaimed series Schitt's Creek, and most recently as Cora Lewis, mother to Batwoman in DC Comics / Warner Brothers hit series of the same name.

With her first new album in ten years, Shakura is back with Hold on to Love; this time in the producer chair alongside co-producers Donna Grantis (Prince/3rd Eye Girl), Keb' Mo,' and Roger Costa (Jeff Healey). The new album features collaborations with international artists, including Eric Gales, Lee Oskar, Terra Lightfoot, Kyla Charter, Larnell Lewis and more.



THE FITZGERALDS

The Fitzgeralds are a sibling band comprised of 3-time Canadian Grand Master Fiddle and Step Dance champions, Tom, Kerry & Julie Fitzgerald. With roots in Canada's renowned Ottawa Valley, their art form stems from the rich tradition of Ottawa Valley fiddling and step dancing. Over the past 15 years, The Fitzgeralds' musical style has evolved to include a strong focus on original compositions and arrangements that fuse their traditional fiddle roots with more modern influences. They have 3 albums to their name, and were nominated for 'Instrumental Group of the Year' at the 2020 Canadian Folk Music Awards. They have toured extensively, performing at theatres and festivals across North America, Germany, and the UK. They have also been featured guests with Canada's Natalie McMaster and Ireland's Nathan Carter among others. In 2017, The Fitzgeralds went 'viral' on Facebook via Ireland's leading newspaper (Independent.ie), with over 8 million views of their original choreographed dance routine! Most recently, they released their debut Christmas album 'A Canadian Christmas', which was nominated for 'ACTRA Recording Artist of the Year' by the Ontario Folk Music Awards 2022.

ADRIAN SUTHERLAND

Adrian Sutherland is a roots-rock recording artist with heart from Attawapiskat on James Bay. He's a singer, songwriter, speaker, author, advocate, entrepreneur, and the fascinating founder and frontman of all-Cree rockers Midnight Shine. He's also a traditional knowledge keeper and respected cultural leader, fluent in Mushkegowuk Cree. After constructing his own recording studio inside a shipping container during the pandemic, Adrian worked remotely with producers Colin Linden (Nashville) and Tim Vesely (Toronto) to record debut solo album When The Magic Hits earning nominations at the 2022 JUNO Awards and 2023 Canadian Folk Music Awards.



AERIALISTS

JUNO nominated neo-folk group Aerialists take a distinctive hybrid approach to tradition, combining deep roots in Scottish Gaelic, Norwegian, and Irish folk music with a unique post rock bent. On harp, fiddle, guitar, bass, & drums, Aerialists are ethereal yet precise, technical yet visceral.



ALEKSI CAMPAGNE

Aleksi Campagne is a bilingual contemporary indie-folk fiddle-singer from Montreal. As the son of Canadian Folk icon Connie Kaldor and student of Jazz Violin Legend Didier Lockwood, Aleksi combines his powerful voice with rich songwriting, all while accompanying himself on the violin and seamlessly switching between english and french.



ALEXANDER SAINT

Alexander Saint is an artist with bloodlines, deeply tied to the Toronto music scene through his Guyanese-Canadian father. Saint's music is a mature take of honest storytelling about loss, love, and getting off your damn phone.



ALLISON LUPTON BAND

Acclaimed singer/songwriter, flutist and multiple CFMA nominee, Allison Lupton delights listeners with story songs and tunes that take you away to another time and then dance you home again. She has released 4 solo albums, touring here at home and across the UK with members of her all-star band featuring Andrew Collins, Shane Cook, Tony McManus, Joseph Phillips and Ivan Rosenberg. Her most recent release Words of Love earned Allison a CFMA nomination for Traditional Singer of the Year.





AMANDA PENNER

Amanda Penner is a Folk artist from Edmonton who delivers a fierce introspection far beyond her years in her lyricism, only growing in complexity, wit, and wisdom with each listen. Penner has connected with audiences at festivals including the Canmore Folk Festival, Edmonton Folk Festival and the Lethbridge Roots Festival.

6-time Juno nominee, Ammoye delivers a wholly unique future forward reggae sound that incorporates old-school rocksteady, dancehall and dubstep with soul and R&B. With her unique, multidimensional voice and messages of empowerment, Jamaican-born Ammoye is a lightworker and self-declared soul rebel.



ANDDRE MAFRA & THE REFLECTIONS

Anddre Mafra and The Reflections are a folk collective from London. Anddre was a Spotlight Showcase performer at the Folk Music Ontario Conference (2022). Nominated for the EMAC Studios Band of the Year at Fanshawe (2023), "Anddre and The Reflections" portray the feeling of an intimate living room at each show.



ANTHEA FEAVER

Anthea Feaver is a singer-songwriter and traditional folk musician based in Kingston, Ontario. Her debut EP, "Play It Back," reached #1 on Earshot's Folk/Roots/Blues charts, and she is currently working on material for a new album.



BARBRA LICA

Barbra Lica is a JUNO-nominated singer-songwriter based in Toronto who has headlined on stages around the world. Her 2018 album, You're Fine, a cross-genre project combining elements of jazz, folk, and indie pop, has amassed over 5.4 million streams to date on Spotify. She is currently promoting her first ever self-produced EP Imposter Syndrome.





BEAU WHEELER

Beau Wheeler is a queer non-binary powerhouse singer/songwriter based in Vancouver. Beau's dynamic range can lift an audience to its feet in a moment and in the next, stop your heart so the whole room could hear a pin drop. One of Vancouver's punchiest singers.



BENJ ROWLAND

Benj Rowland is the singer-songwriter and instrumentalist behind the well loved Canadian folk duo Mayhemingways. Having toured across Canada many times as part of a band, Community Garden is Benj's first solo album released under his own name. Recorded and produced by Joel Plaskett at his Dartmouth Studio, the album features a collection of songs that speak to small town Ontario.



BERK JODOIN

Indigenous singer/songwriter Berk Jodoin's carefully crafted songs cover difficult topics that are often ignored. Berk hopes that sharing these stories through song bring awareness and understanding to these issues. Fusing together his influences like Steve Earle and Waylon Jennings creates soulful storytelling with just the right amount of gravel.



BILINGUISH BOYS

The Bilinguish Boys are a hilariously-engaging trio from Sudbury, Ontario. Stef Paquette, Dayv Poulin and Edouard Landry have blended in their successful solo projects to create a unique cocktail of vocals, guitars, improv and comedy. They have all the right moves, in both of Canada's official languages.



BROCK STONEFISH

Brock Stonefish has released his debut album after 20 years of touring the United States, Canada, and South Korea. The album titled "Turtle Island" was produced by famed Actor/ Musician Gary Farmer who also joined the album playing harmonica and backup vocals. The sound Engineer Jono Manson captured the sound of 90's GRAMMY winning rock band Blues Traveler. Currently the track "Residential Redemption is #1 on Top 40 Indigenous Music Countdown, Also on the album is "Pounding On My Soul" the single that reached #6 on Top 40 back in 2021 featured on SIRIUS XM Satellite Radio. Brock Stonefish has performed over the years alongside many celebrated names like BB King, Ice Cube, Kiss, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Our Lady Peace, Steven Page and Taj Mahal. In the summer of 2022 Brock Stonefish took the stage at a LANDBACK concert with Serena Ryder on drums and Tom Wilson on Vocals. Brock Stonefish is no stranger to Serena Ryder as they studied guitar together in a prestigious high school arts program. Along with Derek Miller, Brock Stonefish was a feature on the Gary Farmer Troublemaker All Star Tour summer of 2023.





BROKE FUSE

CALLIE MCCULLOUGH

A modern songwriter inspired by timeless bluegrass and old-school country music, Callie McCullough has chased her unique muse for years, making contemporary roots music that nods to the legends who came before her. It's a sound anchored by intimate ballads and McCullough's gorgeous voice, whose Alison Krauss-worthy tone and Dolly Parton-sized beauty stand in contrast to her dry humor and larger-than-life personality. McCullough's Debut album has quickly put her on the map garnering a Canadian Country Music Association CCMA Nomination for Alternative Country Album of the Year, two CMAO Nominations for Rising Star and Songwriters of the Year, National Television Appearances, and glowing features from Industry giants Billboard Magazine, American Songwriter, and CMT. Emotional and eclectic, After Midnight features first-class picking from members of the Grammy-winning bluegrass band Union Station and western-swing super-group The Time Jumpers.





CAMILO RESTREPO

Camilo's soloist repertoire ranges from classic Robert Johnson takes, to the more obscure predecessors of the genre, while stopping to salute folk masters such as Dave van Ronk and Doc Watson. Camilo's rendition of classic tunes are meticulously respectful of original recordings while inevitably conveying his personal sensitivities. Camilo plays all around Toronto, a city that continues to provide the atmosphere for him to hone his skills and channel his lifelong love for the Blues. Camilo has played solo acoustic Blues in the US, Canada and South America.

His latest album, When Country Gets The Blues, is nominated for Country Recording of The Year at the 2022 East Coast Music Awards. Often stylistically compared to mentors like Eric Clapton and Otis Redding, Charlie has always been recognized for exploring his musical horizons. As a five-time ECMA winner and eight-time Nova Scotia Music Award winner Charlie has earned awards for Blues, Pop, and R&B/Soul Recordings of the Year, and on multiple occasions been recognized as Entertainer of the Year. A'Court has also received multiple Maple Blues Award nominations including Male Vocalist and Songwriter of the Year.



CHARM OF FINCHES

Australian sister duo Charm of Finches deliver intricate folk-pop that is simultaneously graceful and darkly bewitching. Their seamless blood harmonies traverse melancholy and wonder in equal measure. Winners of the Australian Folk Music Awards Best Folk Album (2022) and Music Victoria Best Folk Act (2021), the duo toured the UK/EU extensively during 22/23.



CLAIRE COUPLAND

There is a pureness to Claire's voice that can silence a room. A moving songwriter and compelling guitarist, Claire combines smooth folk finger picking, jazz influenced progressions, soaring melodies and a graceful contemporary feel to folk music, always with a touch of her 'wicked sense of humour' (Rik Emmett, Triumph).

Folk icon Connie Kaldor, CM is celebrating 45 years in show business with her upcoming 18th album! In her most recent project "How You Love Me" set to be released in spring 2023, she is poised to take her sound to the next level, pushing the boundaries of pop music. With her exceptional talent and unique approach, Emily Jean Flack is a true Canadian artist.

Singing in Kinyarwanda, Swahili, French, and English; she conveys positive messages to the world.



ERICA DEE MAH

Erica Dee Mah is a singer-songwriter, storyteller, and contemporary guzheng player based in Whitehorse, Yukon. She writes lyrically rich songs on the traditional 21-stringed Chinese zither that explore themes of Chinese-Canadian identity across generations. Garnetta later became the lead vocalist and drummer for Torornto's first all female reggae band, Sweet Sensation. Garnetta has performed on the same stage with Platinum/Grammy Award artists Maxi Priest, Shabba Ranks, Shaggy, Gregory Issac, Sean Kingston and Platinum/Grammy soul legends Percy Sledge, Dorothy Moore, The Manhattans and have recently performed on stage with the King of Boogie Woogie, Kenny "Blues Boss" Wayne.

She performed at the 35th Annual Women Blues Revue held at Massey Hall, in Toronto, Ontario, with some of Canada's top female blues singers. November/22. In 2021, after facing numerous personal challenges, she decided to take full-time control of her band,

Garnetta Cromwell & DaGroovmasters, determined to create music that reflected her life's journey. The band itself, DaGroovmasters, is composed of talented musicians specializing in soulful blues.



GENEVIÈVE RACETTE

Winner of the CFMA 'Emerging singer-songwriter of the Year', Geneviève Racette launched her third folk-pop album Satellite, collaborating with City and Color. Surrounded by an all-female team, Geneviève conquers fans through her intimate vocals, lush instruments and expressive harmonies, evoking moments of love, heartbreak, healing and falling in love again.



HALEY MIDGETTE

Haley Midgette is a Toronto-based actor and singer-songwriter from Scarborough, Ontario. Combining a classic folk sound with modern atmospheric elements, Haley's music is driven by vulnerable, introspective lyrics, and melodies both elegant and catchy. She's appeared in indie films and national commercial broadcasts in the US in Canada.

Kristen's earthy introspective folk/pop songs have the warmth of a golden sunset. With intricate and moody elements, her songs embrace life?s challenges and quiet moments of beauty, reminiscent of Sarah McLachlan. Her latest album 'Every Season' (Sept 30, 2022) is her most confident, self-assured and emotionally compelling work to date. It is also up for the 2023 ECMA 'Album of the Year' and 'Folk Recording of the Year'.



KUNE

KUNE is an eleven-piece collective made up of ten immigrant musicians from all over the world and one metis-Canadian. KUNE's artistic practice captures and recreates the experience of living in Toronto, one of the world's most diverse cities. The musicians are from places like Iraq, Cuba, Peru, Burkina-Faso and China. The instruments they play are not often played together on stage; like the Tar, the Dizi, the Cajon and the Ngoni. It is a space in which to remember where we came from and learn from each other's differences. Together KUNE members compose, arrange and perform music that honors their cultural roots and creates connections with others through curiosity, experimentation and dialogue.



KUNLE

Kunle is a Nigerian-born multi-instrumentalist, singer, and songwriter based in Toronto. His music blends contemporary styles with West African rhythms and stories, earning him recognition, numerous awards, and an Ontario Premier Award nomination. Kunle recently served as music director for the Stratford Festival's 2022 play Death and The King's Horseman by Wole Soyinka.



LAND HEART SONG

Land Heart Song is Tiiu Strutt (she/her), a songwriter and educator, passionate about supporting families and children in nurturing their love for the land through song. With catchy melodies and endearing stage presence, Land Heart Song's performances spark wonder and joy, inspiring everyone in the family to sing along and deepen relationship with the natural world.





LEAF RAPIDS

The band Leaf Rapids combines gritty guitar with angelic vocals, bass and drums and the eerie sound of the theremin to create a Canadiana soundscape. They croon about circling vultures, barbershop stabbings and velvet paintings to name a few. Collectively the band boasts Juno Awards, International tours and decent hygiene.



LEAH HOLTOM

With her tender, yet powerfully soaring vocals, Leah has always had a gift to impact people with her music. Born and raised in Brampton, 22 year old Leah truly embodies and embraces the storytelling nature of country, folk and bluegrass music, aiming to bring connection and authenticity through her artistry.



LES ROYAL PICKLES

The Royal Pickles have built a repertoire rich in history, as well as original compositions inspired by the New Orleans Hot Jazz pioneers of the 1920s and 1930s. The vibrant energy of the Royal Pickles has made them an essential part of Montreal nightlife, festivals and dance competitions alike.



LITTLE MISTY

Little Misty is a progressive folk band from Montreal, formed by singer Kathryn Samman and guitarist François Jalbert. Known for their projects in the Montreal jazz scene and their work with bands like Bellflower and Tunnel, the young duo stepped out of the box into a more folk/bluegrass and progressive sound.



LOCARNO

Locarno is a Mexican-based, Latin music project based out of Vancouver. BC. It's mostly acoustic in nature and draws heavily on Mexican musical idioms such as Son Jarocho, Huapango, and Marimba based folk music. The band oscillates between original compositions and traditional songs.





LOGAN AND NATHAN

Featuring the ethereal voice of Logan Thackray and guitar stylings of Nathan Turner Vancouver-based duo Logan and Nathan blend folk with influences of jazz syncopation and soul. Swapping songs and weaving improvisation through harmonies.



Lonesome ace

The Lonesome Ace Stringband is an old-time trio with bluegrass chops that plays really good folk music. With trio vocals over fiddle, banjo and bass, they draw the listener in with a sound that ranges from sparse fragility to a joyous bellow that sounds like a much bigger band.



LOS VARIANTS

Los Variants is the brainchild of Vince Maccarone. We celebrate diversity by bending some of the rules of staying in one genre, this 5-piece super band uses versatile musicians deliver a spectacular performance and explore the connections between our collective musical and cultural backgrounds to create a seamless mosaic of international groove.



LUKE WALLACE

Luke Wallace embodies a new wave of politically charged folk music. Luke is found performing at festivals, The United Nations, venues all over North America, writing the soundtrack for a movement of people rising up to meet the challenges of our times.



MARTHE HALVORSEN

Marthe Halvorsen is a Montreal based Norwegian artist, songwriter and producer who weaves together dreamy evocative Indie Folk Music. Her debut album All is in the Seed was released in 2018, receiving great acclaim around the world. Several of the songs from her album made it on to Norwegian National Radio as well as CBC Radio in Canada. With a unique sincerity in her voice Marthe Halvorsen has a special ability to touch something deep inside the listener. Having grown up in Arctic Norway, nature has always been an important source of inspiration in her music. The spaciousness and the raw unpolished landscapes of the north can be traced in her sense of songwriting and taste in music production. With a love for a minimalistic and an unpolished sound, Marthe seeks to write songs that carry an intention and that comes from an authentic place within herself. Emerging out of the thriving music scene of Montreal, Marthe Halvorsen is currently in the process of finishing her sophomore album, to be released later this year. On her new album the Norwegian artist has been diving deeper into the producer role, crafting and perfecting her very own characteristic sound.





MATT ZADDY

Matt Zaddy is a storyteller at heart. Blending folk-rock / modern soul, his music is layered with tales of life, love, hardship, & redemption, and the intention of building real connection, regardless of genre restrictions. His new single 'What Comes Around' was released in June 2023, with 182 Spotify playlists adds.



MEREDITH MOON

Meredith Moon has spent the last decade travelling her home of Canada, and the world, by multiple means, finding inspiration for her unique style of songs which are crafted in a true storyteller's fashion. She has been described as a 'gem' among the Old-Time music scene for her unusual expression of the genre, combining influences of folk-punk with traditional Appalachian sound.



METÒ

Metò is a Quebec city based multi-instrumentalist, singer-songwriter and producer. As his father fell seriously ill in 2019 and had to be taken care of until his passing, Metò decided to adjourn his reality in triumphant melodies of romanticized epiphanies. From his bedroom and a friend's basement, he organically sewed a tunic of sound to produce his first EP: Alstroemeria.



MIA KELLY

Mia Kelly is a bilingual, Gatineau-based singer/songwriter. Through folk-roots with a soulful twist, her powerful voice draws audiences into heartfelt stories and raw emotions. Mia takes you on a journey through sweet ballads to sing-alongs and stomping feet. As one of Ottawa's ten artists to watch in 2020 (Ottawa Citizen), and Gatineau's young creative of 2022 (Culturiades), and Canadian representative at the Francophone Games 2023 in the Democratic republic of Congo, Mia Kelly is making her mark in the Canadian Folk scene.



MIKE STEVENS TRIO FEATURING THE SCHOTTS

Mike Stevens is an award-winning harmonica player, composer and author living in Sarnia, Ontario Canada. His talent is as unorthodox as his career trajectory. As a ground-breaking performer, composer, educator, keynote speaker and author, Mike continues to expand the paradigms of harmonica, balancing tradition with cutting-edge innovation.





MIRJA KLIPPEL

The Finnish songwriter and singer, Mirja Klippel, is a remarkable talent on the alternative folk music scene. Based in Denmark and supported by the critically acclaimed guitarist Alex Jønsson, she draws the audience into an ethereal and organic universe, which has led to several nominations for Danish Music Awards.



MOIRA & CLAIRE

Nova Scotia's Moira & Claire write lighthearted, folk-pop songs that appeal to East and West Coasters and everyone in between. The sisters have been singing together for longer than their professional careers, their voices harmonizing in the kind of familial magic that only living together your entire life can attain.



MOSKITTO BAR

Moskitto Bar is a musical journey from Brittany the Celtic part of France, to the Middle East with a few stops in the Balkan and even south America. It's a band that represent the mix of cultures that you encounter ina city like Toronto. They have already performed all over Toronto and also in many festivals across Ontario and Quebec. They are ready to continue their journey and share their message of hope and joy.



MY SON THE HURRICANE

My Son the Hurricane is a multi-horn, multi-drummer, multi-singer brass funk beast from Niagara, ON. The 12-piece brass-dance crew has toured over multiple countries and played some of Canada, USA and Europe's biggest festivals. Over 45 sold out shows in 2022 proves that there is no live show like My Son the Hurricane. The band features trumpets, saxophones, trombones, drums, guitar, keys, percussion and a wild front woman. We dare you not to dance! In 2023, the band will take on an over 70 date Canada, United States and Europe-wide tour and share the stage with acts like Foo Fighters, Jason Isbell and Colin James.



nadine altounji

Montreal-based singer, songwriter and multi-instrumentalist Nadine Altounji has been active on the cultural scene for some twenty years. In 2018, she spends four months in Ecuador and Peru to research regional musical traditions. A fruitful collaboration followed with Peruvian and Montreal artists that lead to the creation of her audio-visual EP: The Stories that Tie Us to Trees Vol. 1.





NATASHA ROLDÁN

Natasha Roldán is a Colombian-Canadian singer-songwriter based in Toronto. Her music draws from the influences of jazz and traditional Latin American and European music with an alternative touch. Before its official release, her EP No Apologies, co-produced alongside Colombian producer/composer Jorge Gil, debuted on Canadian radio in three provinces, including a feature on JazzFM 91's Jazzology. Natasha and Jorge also joined forces to create Songs to Travel the World, a performance project that explores some of the most beautiful songs from abroad in different languages and genres, featuring guest musicians from diverse backgrounds. Natasha has been awarded the Ella Fitzgerald Award for Jazz Performance and the Sorbara Award in Music. She was also a two-time nominee for best jazz vocals at the Toronto Independent Music Awards (2015 & 2016), among other accolades. Natasha kicks off 2023 as one of RBC's Launchpad Artists, Small World Music Incubator Artists, and one of Tranzac's Artists in Residence, all while producing her first album Ya No Estoy Aquí (coming in 2023), with support from the Ontario Arts Council. In this album, Natasha shares stories about migration, violence in Latin America, revolution, and love through Latin Folk rhythms.



NOTAS DE 4

Notas de 4 is Calgary's original Latin Jazz ensemble, winner of Best World Recording of the year 2020 by YYC MUSIC Awards and was nominated twice for WCMA as Global Artist of the year 2021 & 2022. The ensemble's original compositions are inspired from Flamenco, Latin Jazz and traditional music from Cuba and Mexico.



OH, BERLIN

Oh, Berlin is a new artist project fronted by singer, songwriter, multi-instrumentalist and producer Ben Heffernan. Heffernan has recorded and toured as a solo artist since the mid-2010s, receiving acclaim via award nominations and appearances at high-profile festivals, but steps out into new territory with Oh, Berlin, a project which sees him exploring indie rock and dance rock sensibilities alongside his signature brand of folk-pop. On September 21, Oh, Berlin released its first single, entitled "Who's Gonna Love You Now?".



onion Honey

Onion Honey makes music like an old-fashioned string band - sweet and sharp and savoury, mountain music fresh from the Grand River Valley. The Kitchener-based quartet play retrofitted traditional tunes and original songs with old souls; they have been heard on radio stations across Canada and gig regularly around Southwestern Ontario.





PASCALE LEBLANC

Singer-songwriter Pascale LeBlanc uses inspirations from her cultural mix (Quebec/ Haïti) to create songs that blend French and Creole. On stage, we discover a multi-instrumentalist who has a beautiful talent as a storyteller. Her music has this disarming authenticity where cultures have only one race: the human race.



PAULA SOFÍA

Paula Sofía is a Guatemalan singer-songwriter based in Toronto. Most of her work is in Spanish, which makes her music and live performances very dynamic where she forms playful connections with the audience from the stage. She is able to convey universal themes through storytelling, imagery, and quirky songwriting. Her first solo project, Quinto de Hora (which translates into "A Fifth of an Hour"), produced by Alysha Brilla, is an album of 12 one-minute songs. This project marked the beginning of her career, as she plans to release the other 4 "Fifths of an Hour" over the years while collaborating with different artists to get "Around the Clock in 60 songs". She is currently working on her next conceptual project which will include 6 full-length songs.



PRESSGANG MUTINY

Pressgang Mutiny is a Toronto-based quartet of dynamic musicians and tall ship sailors, dedicated to discovering shanties and work songs and the people who sing them. They have toured extensively across Canada, the US, UK, and Europe, showcasing the world's first truly multicultural music. They are currently producing a record and documentary film with traditional shanty singers and sailors from St. Vincent and the Grenadines.



QUOTE THE RAVEN

Quote the Raven are a Newfoundland based duo who charm audiences with haunting harmony and a deadpan humour. An extensive tour history over the past few years they have travelled Canada, performing at some major festivals as well as Trinidad, Germany and showcasing at Americana Fest in Nashville.



RACHAEL KILGOUR

Rachael Kilgour is a Canadian-American songwriter and performing artist whose intimate songs and performances have endeared her to listeners and fellow songwriters alike. The award-winning songwriter (2015 NewSong Music, 2017 Kerrville New Folk) releases her fourth album, written in memory of her late father and produced by Rose Cousins, in autumn of 2023.





RAHAEL

Rahael creates an immersive and cinematic world that celebrates the intimacy of love. A self-taught guitarist from Vancouver, BC with Ethiopian and Eritrean heritage, her songwriting is inspired by her personal experiences and guided by the ethereal moments love and relationships have to offer.



Rebekah Hawker

With roots in church choir harmonies and songwriting prowess built on an art-rock adolescence, it's not so surprising that Rebekah Hawker ultimately found herself at the intersection of country and folk. Hawker embraces the full spectrum of "country,"— from John Prine's lore-spinning to Linda Ronstadt's honeyed vocals, Kacey Musgraves' resilient sheen, and the vulnerability of Edwards. Hawker's latest single "Ticket" is a classic midtempo country song about two things that never go out of style, in any genre: broken hearts and broken dreams. She sings of bastards and radio play, social media and getting ghosted, but flips the script in a canny way, declaring a positive outlook despite the rest: "I'm satisfied with the long shot / I've got a ticket." To have hope is better than the alternative. "You're on your own," she says, "deciding that this thing has worth." In 2020 Rebekah's song 'Catch You' won Folk Music Ontario's Songs from the Heart award and in 2022 she was selected as an official showcasing artist at their annual conference. She was recently selected as a participant in the 2023 RBC x Launchpad Music Entrepreneurship Program and released her latest single "Ticket" with the support of FACTOR and Ontario Arts Council in September 2023.



REDFOX

Winner of Emerging Artist of the Year at the 2023 Canadian Folk Music Awards, RedFox is coming onto the scene with their debut full length album 'Stranger Love'. Blending sounds from their acoustic roots background with electric indie these five foxies will have you dancing one minute and holding your loved ones the next. RedFox has opened for such acts as Tom Cochrane and George Thorogood, as well as participated in major music festivals throughout Canada such as Mariposa, Summerfolk, and Living Roots.



RONJA MALTZAHN

The singer and cellist Ronja weaves a tapestry of tales through songs, inviting the listener to embark on a journey across the globe with her band family of multi instrumentalists. The symphonic Folkpop project has been awarded with the Panikpreis 2021 as well as the HSS-Songwriterprize 2022.



RORY TAILLON

Ottawa-based singer/songwriter Rory Taillon is a road warrior, touring across the country and back again. He has the soul of the East coast but the sound of the West in his songs with a voice to match the majesty of the Rockies. Because Rory Taillon is not just an entertainer, he is a performer. It's just that simple, when Rory Taillon sings everything stops and when its starts again it's all changed. It's just that simple, like folk.





RUBE & RAKE

Rube & Rake engage audiences with a mixture of stories, intricate guitar work, and rich vocal harmonies. After working together for the past 6 years out of St. John's, NL, Josh Sandu and Andrew Laite have fused an intimate musical connection that comes across in every new song and performance. ECMA 2022 Songwriter of the Year and 2020 Music NL Folk/Roots Artist of the Year award winners, Rube & Rake's music is an exercise in creating something beyond the sum of their parts.



SARAH HILTZ

Sarah Hiltz is a contemporary folk artist whose upcoming project Exit Interview (2024) examines how we navigate seasons of uncertainty in our lives. It stems from Hiltz's research on liminality and winter farming practices in Alberta and Ontario. The songs explore these themes lyrically and through her ensemble's musical arrangements.



SARAH JANE SCOUTEN

Four-time Canadian Folk Music Award nominee, Sarah Jane Scouten is a songwriter of rare quality, combining sounds of early country music, ballad singing, folk rock and 60's soul. It's modern indie Americana that knows exactly where it comes from, with confidence and sophistication only bought by time. Surrounding herself with top-notch musicians, the live show is as dynamic as her four (soon to be five) albums: at any moment making feet move or eliciting laughter or tears. She is dry, funny, irreverent yet generous. She has a job to do and she takes it very seriously: to entertain, to inspire and to be cathartic. An ever expanding palette and a warbling iconic country voice 'honed over many a campfire' brings a freshness to her brand of ambient indie Americana. It's as relevant today as it is rooted in the music of her forebears.



SEAN PINCHIN

Juno Nominated and Internationally Recognized Singer/ Songwriter/ Slide Guitarist Sean Pinchin has been a steady presence on the Festival circuit for nearly 2 decades. Since his first performance in 2005 while opening for Sawyer Brown as Guitarist / 2nd Vocalist in a Gretchen Wilson Tribute band, Sean had begun a regular pre - pandemic life on the road performing roughly 200 shows a year all through North America. Recording original music and creating beautifully constructed interpretations of classic Blues and Roots music since 2007, he received a (2014) Maple Blues Nomination for Best New Artist, his 2016 Release "Monkey Brain" received the Juno Nomination for Best Blues Album of the Year (2017) and he was recognized by the Toronto Blues Society as Semi Finalist for the Road to Memphis Challenge (2019). In (2020) Sean recorded guitar for the "Lily Pad Bop" by Splash'N Boots featuring Jill Barber which won the Juno Award for Best Children's Album. During his almost 20-year career Sean has opened for Tinsley Ellis, leff Lang, Mel Brown, Steve Strongman, Monkey Junk, Phillip Sayce, and Kim Churchill. And as a member of the Dione Taylor Band since (2014) Sean has shared the stage with such Internationally recognized acts as War and Treaty, Colin James, Birds of Chicago, Serena Ryder, MCrary Sisters, Harry Manx, Blind Boy Paxton, Harrison Kennedy, Carl, Samantha Martin and Delta Sugar and Guy Davis.





SELCI

Calgary based singer-producer Selci bridges the iconoclastic electronics of chamber pop with scintillating dance music to shape her sonic vision. While trained in opera, contemporary and classical musical styles, Selci uses ambience and rhythm to compose sounds that exist on the fringes of pop music. Her upcoming double album Fallen Woman was co-produced and mixed by grammy award winning engineers Sylvia Massy and Mark Lawson. The record is a celebration of modern relationships and an ode to fallen women of the past. Each track showcases Selci's dynamic vocal range and her broad palette as a producer. Since 2018, Selci has released a string of Ep's and singles while touring Canada multiple times. Her music has received praise from CBC, EARMILK, Exclaim!, The Sunday Times, Bristol In Stereo, Indie 88, Refinery 29 and many more. Her A Soft Place EP charted nationally on college radio and was ranked the #1 electronic album on Calgary's CJSW in 2020. Selci is releasing her debut full length album Fallen Woman.



SENAYA

Senaya lights up the stage, fiercely and magnificently free. The author, composer, performer and guitarist, who received a Canada Council grant for the Arts, combines African and Caribbean rhythms, jazz, funk, blues, folk, R&B and even negro spirituals in her SoûlKreôl. The singer-songwriter call her music soûlkreôl. Upon hearing Senaya, you travel from blues to folk by way of funk, jazz, zouk, gwoka and biguine to reach Afrobeat and makossa sounds, in French, English, Wolof and Creole. Senaya is a multidisciplinary artist? a lyricist, composer, singer, poet, guitarist, producer and entrepreneur. Self-taught from the start, she has asserted her unique, powerful style. Born in Dakar to a Senegalese father and a Guadeloupean mother, Senaya has lived in both lands. These multicultural origins have shaped her art: a firmly rooted style of music. If Black music were a tree, Senaya's music would not be missing any roots. In 2003 and 2004, she was named winner of the year at the Granby International Song Festival and received the Coup de coeur award at the Vues sur la relève festival. In 2005, she co-produced her first album, Garde la tête haute, which earned her a Juno. With her sister, she set up her own production company to serve her yearnings as an independent artist. Her warm, haunting voice and incredible stage charisma enhance an extraordinary musical style that warms the soul and celebrates life. In February 2023, as part of Black History Month, Senaya presented her long-awaited second album to her public under the label Disques Nuits d'Afrique.



SHANNA IN A DRESS

There's no one quite like Shanna in a Dress. This quirky millennial who sucks at dating is known for her bold, authentic humor and candor and takes audiences on an emotional journey from laughter to tears and everything in between. She is an award-winning songwriter, internationally touring rising star who feels like she could be your best friend.





SHAUIT

Nominated twice as indigenous artist of the year for the prestigious ADISQ awards gala, Shauit sings about the complexity and beauty of the Innu nation. Most of the time in Innu, but sometimes in French, Shauit brings a music that is as festive and unifying as it is introspective and hypnotizing. After a multiple award-winning album that has taken him to more than 7 different countries and to perform some 400 shows, locally, nationally and internationally, Shauit continues his artistic journey and continues to sail towards new artistic oceans with his new album NATUKUN. NATUKUN means "remedy" in Innu. Both in love with Quebec music and also deeply rooted in his native Innu culture, Shauit is preparing a strong and beautiful comeback for his next opus. Accompanied by more traditional instrumentation with, among other things, violin, guitars, and other more classically Quebec sounds, Shauit offers a veritable musical fresco that will echo Quebec territories and their inhabitants, in all their richness and diversity.



SHAWNA CASPI

Singer-songwriter Shawna Caspi creates an inviting space for authentic human connection with her powerful voice and poetic lyrics paired with intricate and compelling fingerstyle guitar accompaniment. Her songs resonate with stories that are relatable, but told in new and unexpected ways.



SOPHIE LUHACS

Hailing from Montreal by way of Budapest, Sophie Lukacs is a kora player and singer-songwriter. Sophie's music is rooted in love and vulnerability, drawing inspiration from her training in western classical violin, seven years of study in Mali with kora virtuoso Toumani Diabaté, and her roots in Hungarian folk music. Her debut album will be released in April 2023, and features 2 tracks with the legendary Habib Koité.



STEÁFÁN & SASKIA

Saskia from the UK, & Steáfán from Ireland, moved to Canada in 2007 with 3 children and over 800 instruments! After 22 years of playing together, and many sessions under their belt for other people, Steáfán & Saskia released their first duo album called "Moorchild". Between them, Saskia & Steáfán have played with thousands of artists both live and recorded, including Uriah Heep, Loreena Mckennit, Bjork, Depeche Mode, The Band of Hope (with Martin Carthy and Dave Swarbrick), SinÉ, The Afro-Celt Sound System, Oliver Schroer, David Newland (in his project Northbound Passage), and most recently Sultans of String, George Crotty, Shannon Linton and MEDUSA. They have been session musicians on TV shows which include Relic Hunter, Earth Final Conflict, Murdoch Mysteries, Copper, Cabinet of Curiosities (Del Torro) and Friends (the one with Ross's Wedding). Together they worked on developing the Celtic music for the hit Broadway show "Come from Away".



STEPH LA ROCHELLE

Breathtaking vocals, heart warming guitar playing, Steph La Rochelle is making her mark. A CCMA Discovery finalist and CCMA award nominated. Most recently starred in Toronto, National Tour, and appeared in UK WestEnd productions of Broadway hit, DearEvanHansen where she collaborated with Alex Lacamoire at The Bluebird in Nashville. An old soul with a gift to share, this songstress will always leave a captivating performance. Factor-funded EP, Wildflower, available now.





SUZIE VINNICK

A Saskatoon native transplanted to the Niagara Region of Ontario, Canada, Suzie Vinnick is the proud owner of a gorgeous voice, impressive guitar and bass chops and an engagingly candid performance style. Suzie has won 11 Maple Blues Awards, 1 Canadian Folk Music Award and is a 3X Juno Nominee. She has also twice won the International Songwriting Competition: Blues Category. She has just released her seventh solo album entitled 'Fall Back Home'.



T. BUCKLEY

Award-winning Canadian songwriter T. Buckley (T is for Tim not related to the late Tim Buckley) looks through the lens of life with his second solo album, Frame By Frame, out on November 5, via Fallen Tree Records. Buckley delivers another trademark smooth and soulful vocal performance that makes him one of western Canada's most talked-about artists. The recording sessions were fused in the winter of 2020 at the National Music Centre in Calgary, Alberta, with notable producer Jeff Kynoch and a core group of players: Jesse Dollimont on mandolin, guitar and backing vocals; Mitch Jay on stringed things; Steve Fletcher on keys and organs; Dan Stadnicki on drums; and Keith Rempel on bass. Kynoch's open-minded sonic approach makes for an excellent pairing with Buckley's spirit of creatively pushing the envelope.



TAMAR ILANA AND VENTANAS

Ventanas is a Toronto-based band fronted by vocalist and dancer Tamar Ilana (Jewish-Indigenous) and featuring the city's finest musicians. Drawing inspiration from legendary artists like Silk Road Ensemble, Paco de Lucía, and Yasmin Levy, they reimagine Mediterranean melodies and flamenco grooves, and mix contemporary interpretations of ancient ballads with original compositions.



TARA MACLEAN

Canadian singer/songwriter Tara MacLean has been an internationally renowned and award-winning recording and touring artist for over 25 years. She released her first album with the Nettwerk Music Group in 1996 and Sony Music Publishing Canada. Since then, she has been signed to Capitol Records as a solo artist and to EMI Canada with her JUNO nominated band Shaye. She has written and recorded six solo albums and two Shaye records. Her first book, Song of the Sparrow, was released on March 14th, 2023 with Harper Collins Canada, followed by the soundtrack for the book on March 31, 2023.



THE BARREL BOYS

A bluegrass powerhouse featuring rich vocal harmonies, killer picking, and charming stage presence, The Barrel Boys are a unique staple of Canadian roots music. Informed by the deep traditions of bluegrass, country, old-time, and Americana, The Boys have crafted their unmistakable sound into a joyful and deeply soulful musical experience.

The Waleed Kush African Jazz Ensemble takes the improvisational qualities of jazz and the beat of ancient African rhythms to literally move, excite and inspire new and old audiences alike.





WAPAMA

WAPAMA is a collective of three dedicated musicians living in Toronto, Canada. They take influences from music and cultures throughout the globe and improvise collectively and intensely.
